Why is research important to us as justice educators?

Helps us learn information about our impact

- Measuring and Learning About Education Impact
 - Is our teaching effective?
 - Are students meeting their learning objectives?
 - Are students developing a professional commitment to social justice?
- Measuring and Learning About Service Impact
 - What are the access to justice needs of communities?
 - Are social justice education programs such as clinics or street law programs meeting client and community needs?
 - Are clients satisfied?
 - What are the results of interventions or assistance that we may provide through clinics, street law or other programs?

Showing impact can help us to get support for social justice teaching initiatives

- Professional Development and Promotion
 - Leads to publication and scholarship
 - Demonstrates effectiveness of teaching and service
- Collaboration with community, university, other institutions
- Curriculum changes
- Enhances reputation of institution and programs
- Resources and Sustainability
 - Develop Institutional Support
 - · Research results can help in obtaining grants and other funding

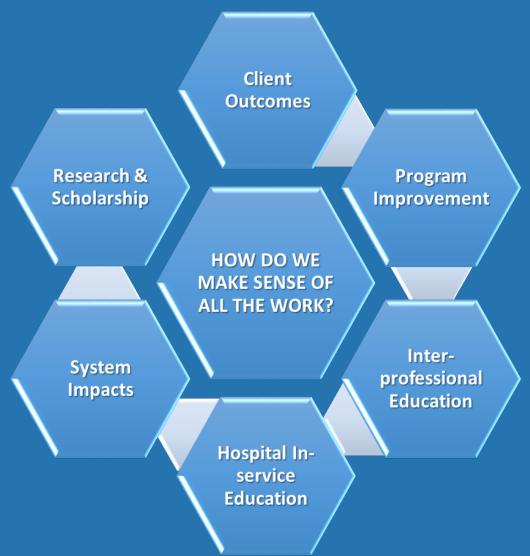
Inter-professional Collaboration

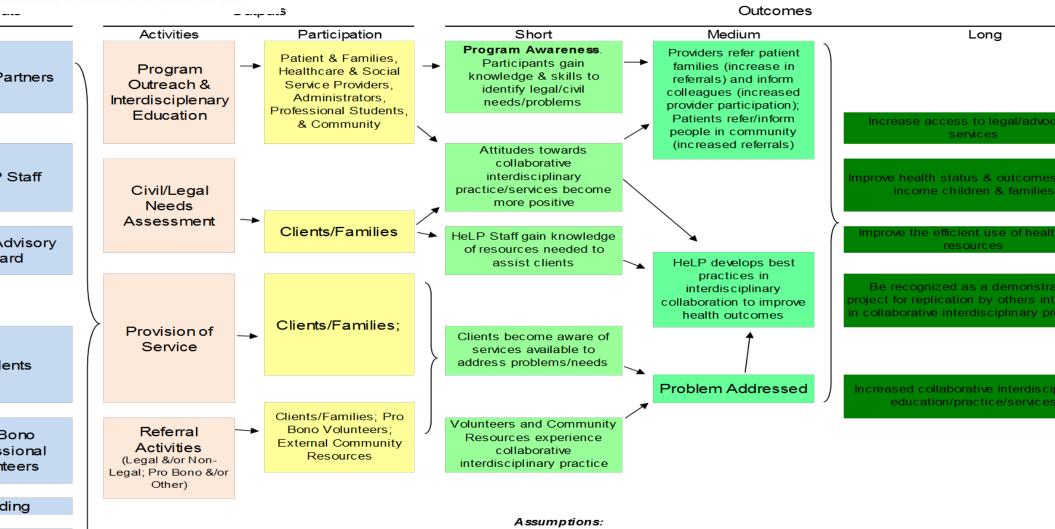

Evaluation Tools

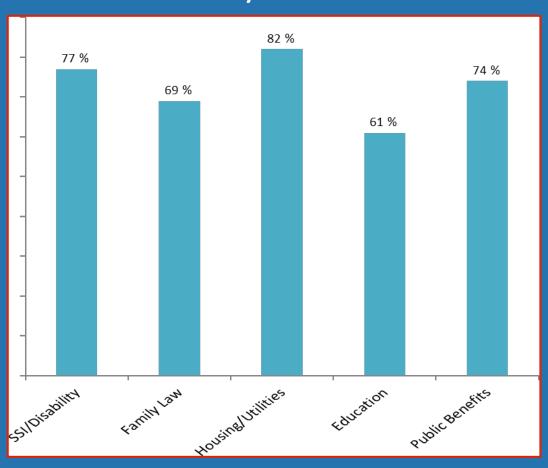
- Annual online survey of referring providers & students
- Post-legal service intervention telephone survey with clients
- Professional education seminar survey
- Longitudinal interdisciplinary education survey of pediatric residents
- Program and health care utilization and cost data to evaluate health and health system outcomes.

Referring Provider Survey

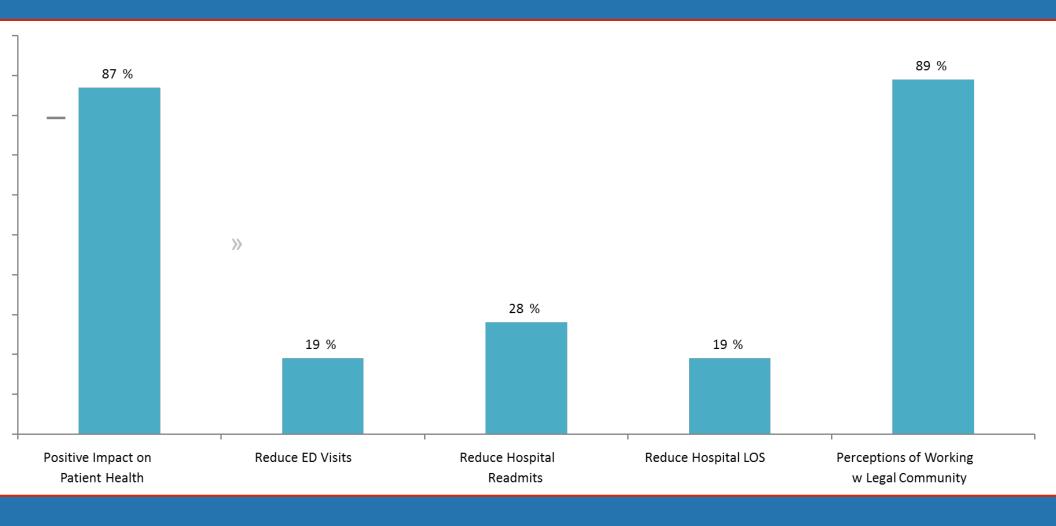
Respondents

Referring Provider Opinions on Outcomes

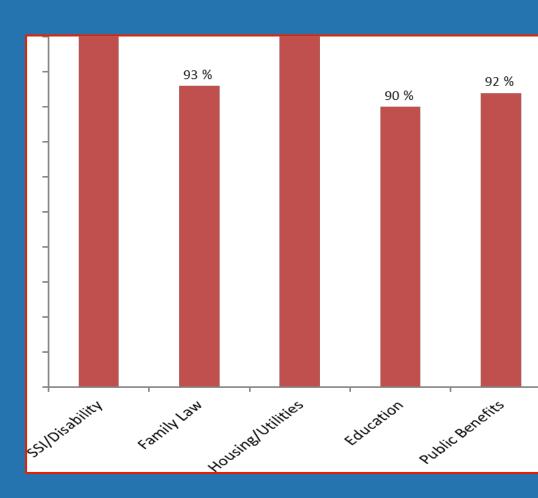


Student Survey

Respondents - Law 94%

21 residents participated in 7 case rounds

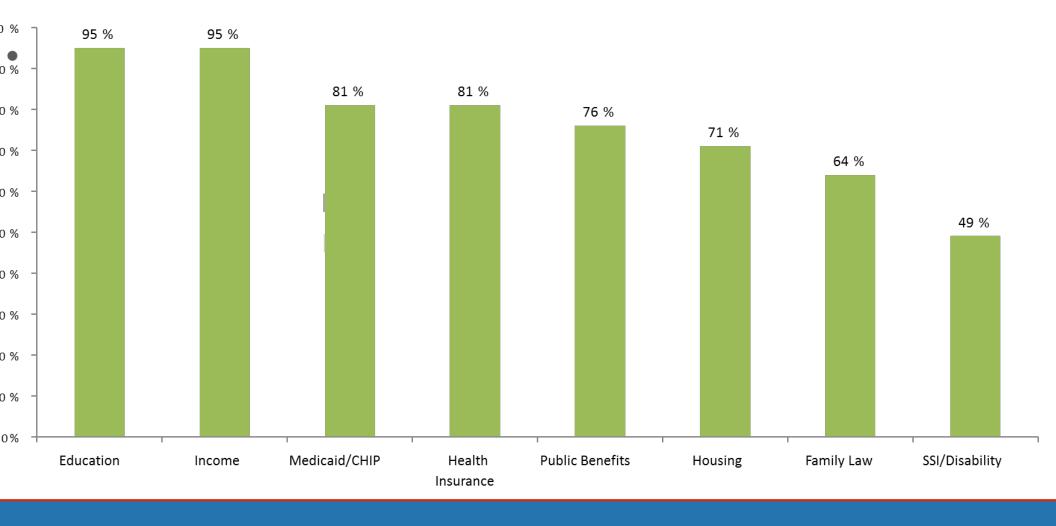
Respondents:

Percent Very Likely/Likely to Screen for Problems

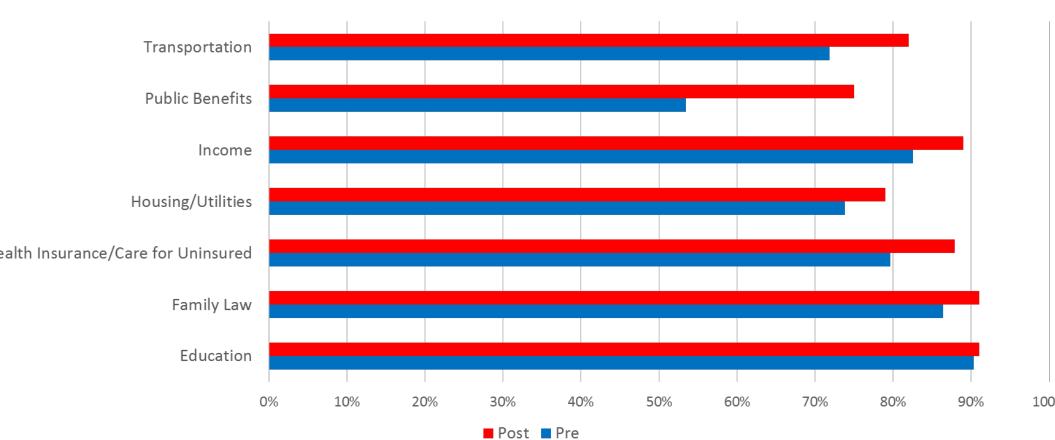


The Morehouse Classes

Survey Results FOM III Percent who report Extremely or Moderately Aware



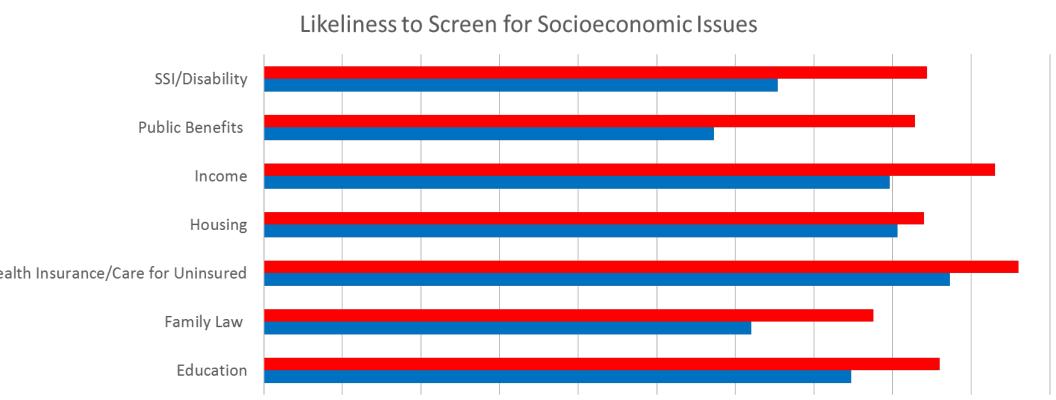


Survey Results FOM III Percent who report Extremely Likely or Likely

Preliminary Findings

Interdisciplinary education seems to increase awareness and likeliness to screen for SEDH among medical students regarding problems affecting the health of their patients

Pediatric Residents Longitudinal Survey

PGY3

- o 70% working with HeLP was valuable
- 100% access to lawyers is helpful in providing patient care
- o 100% importance of knowing resources to address patient legal problems

PGY2

- 100% increased understanding of the relationship among poverty, health, and patient compliance
- 100% HeLP's services positively affected the health and well-being of patients

Client Survey

88% reported being better able to handle similar problems in the future
84% reported HeLP's services had a positive impact on the family's financial situation
56% reported HeLP services allowed their child to spend more time in school
62% of those employed were able to spend more time at work
64% reported that services received improved their children's physical health
88% of client reported that services improved their emotional health
68% reported services improved their child's emotional health

Lessons from HeLP's Evaluation Experience

- MLP model
 - o a great vehicle for clinical education
 - o nimble and flexible
 - o provides richness and complexity
 - o provides meaningful experience for students
 - o can influence students' views of their professions & commitmento to community
 - heightens awareness of SEDH
 - heightens national profiles for hospitals, universities, and training programs

- Novel
- Ethical
- Relevant
